# THE DAYS **OF ANNA** MADRIGAL

Let's start with the sad news: Maupin NOVEL claims this is his last Tales of the City book. The good news? These final days of

his San Francisco friends and lovers, gay and straight, are seriously moving-even if you're new to the treasured series. At 92, transgender landlady Anna Mad-

rigal is intent on "leaving like a lady." Her adoring posse still includes her old tenants Michael Tolliver, Mary Ann Singleton and Brian Hawkins, but has expanded to the next generation, including Brian's novelist daughter Shawna. With San Francisco beset by economic elitism in real life and Maupin-world, it's fitting that much of the book takes place else-

where: There are road trips to Burning Man and the dusty Nevada town the conflicted Anna fled in 1936.


**Armistead** Maupin offers up a bittersweet farewell to his popular Tales of the City series
